FEAST OF THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD IN THE RIVER JORDAN

At this weekend's Masses we will renew our Baptism Promises and bless and be sprinkled with Holy Water. It is a custom in some countries to take Holy water home and sprinkle our homes with it, imploring Gods protection. *Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit (John 3:5)*

The Baptism of Christ (c.1460) by Italian Renaissance master **Piero della Francesco** (**1415-1492**), now housed in **the National Gallery, London**, was painted as an altarpiece for the chapel of St John the Baptist in the communal church of the Camaldolese monks, a contemplative hermit order, in his native town of Borgo San Sepolcro in

One Sacrament, that of Baptism, is shown at the moment of its foundation, in an image to go above the altar, and so preside over the other Sacrament, the Mass. The Sacred body, in which God dwells, central to both Sacraments, is placed with exact centrality.

Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased (Mark 1:9-11)

This is an image of *contrast* in two halves. The axis of it all is Christ, placed as He is between the left side of 'stillness & calm', and the right side, of 'business & activity'. The dove expresses both action and stillness in its hovering, adding to the contrast of stillness and activity in the image.

This is also an image with a *vertical dynamic*. All the figures are standing. The tree in the foreground runs from the bottom to the top of the image, connecting earth with the heavenly realm, as Baptism connects the human with the divine.

This impressive *tree* is firmly rooted in the ground, while its lofty crown arches like a canopy over Christ's Body, and over the central action of the image. Its leaves point from heaven downwards, as if metaphorically declaring, "Thou art my Belovèd Son, in whom I am well pleased".

The dove descends upon Jesus, as told in Scripture (Matthew 13:17) and, with the tree, further emphasises the downward motion of the divine anointing, and completing the presence of the Holy Trinity.

We are addressed by the solid grace of *Christ's pale, luminous body* which stands isolated from the other grouped and overlapping figures. By His sacrificial death, the life of the isolated one becomes the life of the many. Christian baptism is a separation – a ritual death which is a passing-over into new life.

Jesus is depicted naked apart from the loincloth that he wears – dressed as He will be when His sacrifice on the cross is consummated.

Jesus gazes down. His posture is prayerful as He ponders the meaning of His anointing and His sacrificial destiny that His naked vulnerability suggests.

Christ's feet are placed where the water of the stream changes from calm mirror of the hills, to shallow and stony. It is a moment of transition from death to life. Although naked, as he will be at His death, to which Baptism commits Him, the pink cloak left with the angel will clothe His resurrected body - Piero clothes Jesus in the same pink cloak in a fresco in the nearby town hall, of Jesus rising omnipotent from the tomb.

On the right a man pulls on his shirt after he has been baptised. His flesh tone matches that of Jesus, a clear indication that this man, in his humanity, is now joined to Christ. Notice the diagonal dynamic from St John's baptising hand, through his arm and down into the man's arched torso. Rising behind this man, a tree points sharply towards the heavens, indicating the divine destiny of those who are untied to Christ through Baptism.

Behind the bending man are *4 Pharisees and Sadducees* who, according to Matthew 3:7, were present at John's baptisms and were denounced by him. They are heavily clothed. They were only there to "inspect" the goings-on, believing themselves to have no need of baptism.
