DIVINE OFFICE: Week 2



HOLY WEEK/ THE GREAT WEEK

We adore you, O Christ, and we praise You, because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the world

HOLY means 'set apart'. Christians set apart an entire week - Holy Week - to recall the events surrounding the suffering, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus. Holy Week is a time that is set apart in our Church's liturgical year for our spiritual renewal. In fact, the word *holy* refers to anything that is set apart for God's purposes. Holy Week is *holy* precisely because it is time that is set apart for us to focus on how we are spiritually renewed through the suffering, death, and Resurrection of Jesus.

HOLY WEEK WITNESS IN YOUR HOME: Each year, we witness to our Faith in various ways. One of these is the *Good Friday Ecumenical Walk of Witness*. As well as attending Mass, there are other things we can do: place a **branch** on your door or window for Palm Sunday, a **Crucifix** and **image of Divine Mercy** on Good Friday and a **Candle** on Holy Saturday/Easter Sunday. Though the sick and the housebound may be physically separated, none of us are spiritually separated. We are united as the members of the body of Christ. Stay connected to the liturgy however you can, and bear witness to families around you.

HOLY WEEK LITURGIES: Holy Week begins with **Palm Sunday**, the event of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, to the cries of "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!" in fulfilment of the prophesy of the Prophet Isaiah (Matthew 21: 5-9). These words were incorporated into the Liturgy of the Mass in the **Sanctus**.

THE EASTER *TRIDIUM (*3 DAYS) holds a special place in the liturgical year, because it marks the culmination and climax of the yearly celebration in proclaiming the Passion and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Latin word *triduum* refers to a period of three days and has long been used to describe various three-day observances that prepared for a Feast Day through liturgy, prayer, and fasting. But it is most often used to describe the three days prior to the **great Feast of Easter: Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday**, which are followed by the celebration of the **Resurrection of the Lord** on Easter Sunday.

HOLY (MAUNDY) THURSDAY MASS OF THE LORDS SUPPER: This is the commemoration of the Last Supper of Jesus Christ, when he established the Sacrament of the Mass and Holy Communion. He washed his disciples' feet as an example to them of service for them to follow. This ritual reminds us that our baptismal commitment means we are to be servants of one another. Per se, the Mass does not end. There is no dismissal or final blessing. The evening's celebration concludes with a "stripping of the altar" in which not only are all decorations removed, the Blessed Sacrament is taken from the tabernacle on the main altar and processed to an altar of repose outside the main body of the church (usually a side chapel).

GOOD FRIDAY LITURGY OF THE PASSION OF OUR LORD: Upon entering in complete silence (no singing), the priest and assisting ministers makes a full prostration. The Liturgy is in three parts. The first consists of readings from Isaiah, Hebrews, and the Passion account from the Gospel of John. The second is the Veneration of the Cross: a cross is solemnly displayed to the congregation and then venerated by them. The third is Holy Communion. The Eucharist, consecrated at the Holy Thursday Mass is distributed at this service and the Blessed Sacrament is returned to the altar of repose. Everyone departs in silence, and the altar cloth etc is removed, leaving the altar bare.

HOLY SATURDAY EASTER VIGIL: This Mass is held after dusk on Holy Saturday or before dawn on Easter Sunday in anticipation of the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus. First is the **Service of Light**. Mass begins outside the church around a large **fire**. This new fire symbolises the light of Christ entering the world and dispelling the darkness of sin and death. The Paschal candle is blessed and then lit from this fire. The Paschal candle will be used throughout the season of Easter, remaining in the sanctuary area, and throughout the coming year at baptisms and funerals, reminding all, that Christ is "light and life." Once the candle has been lit there follows the ancient and dramatic rite of the *Lucernarium*, in which the candle is carried by a priest through the nave of the darkened church, stopping three times to chant an acclamation such as 'Christ our Light' to which the assembly responds 'Thanks be to God.' As the candle proceeds through the church, the baptised light their candles from the flame of the Paschal candle, symbolising the spread of the "Light of Christ" throughout those gathered, and the darkness is dispersed. Next, the Exultet (Easter Proclamation) is intoned. The Liturgy of the Word consists of seven readings from the Old Testament, although it is permitted to reduce this number for pastoral reasons (if reduced, it is customary to use readings 1, 3, 5 and 7). Each reading is followed by a psalm and a prayer relating what has been read in the Old Testament to the Mystery of Christ. After these readings conclude, the Gloria is sung for the first time since before Lent (with the exception of Holy Thursday, which is the only time it is heard during the 40 days of Lent), and the church bells and the organ, silent since that point on Holy Thursday, are sounded again – The opening collect (prayer) is read. A reading from the Epistle to the Romans is proclaimed, followed by the chanting of Psalm 118. The Alleluia is sung for the first time since the beginning of Lent, and the Gospel of the Resurrection is proclaimed. It is during this Mass that the Rite of Christian **Initiation** takes place - people desiring to enter into full communion with the Church through the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and the Holy Eucharist). The Easter Vigil then concludes with a Liturgy of the Eucharist.

REMEMBER - GOOD FRIDAY IS A DAY OF FAST & ABSTINANCE: Fasting means that *the amount of food we eat is considerably reduced*, ie. one full meal, plus two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. Abstinence means that we give up a particular kind of food or drink or form of amusement. *Those over 18 are bound by the law of fasting until they turn 60*, while all over *14 are bound by the law of abstinence*. Common sense should prevail: those who are physically or mentally ill, pregnant, nursing, or who perform a job in which their safety would be compromised (eg. diabetics, those operating heavy machinery) are excused from fasting.
